Dear Chairman Frelinghuysen, Ranking Member Lowey, Chairman Cole, and Ranking Member DeLauro,

As you continue consideration of fiscal year 2017 funding levels and begin to develop and mark up the fiscal year 2018 Labor-HHS Appropriations bill, we are writing to urge you to include funding for the **Social Innovation Fund (SIF)**, which has a strong history of spurring innovation, rewarding results, and catalyzing cross-sector partnerships.

The Social Innovation Fund recognizes that government alone cannot be expected to generate the evidence-based, positive outcomes we need in America. The SIF has played a critical role in supporting high-impact and evidence-based nonprofits in communities across the country, bringing innovators from multiple sectors together to develop collective solutions to some of America's most pressing challenges. Under the SIF structure, federal funds are leveraged through matching funds to ensure that results-driven organizations are able to bring their effective programs to scale at minimal expense to the federal taxpayer.

Through the authorization granted in 2014, SIF funds are also being used to explore and experiment with Pay for Success (PFS) approaches. This funding plays a critical role in addressing the limited resources currently available for planning, feasibility studies, project structuring, and pipeline development of PFS projects. The SIF PFS provisions are critically important at a time when there is a great need for improving the services that we provide and ensuring efficient use of our limited resources.

Since 2009, SIF grantees have expanded evidence-based programs through over 1,800 local organizations in 46 states and the District of Columbia. Through its private sector partnerships, the SIF has invested over \$1 billion dollars in interventions ranging from supportive housing, reentry support for justice involved youth and adults, workforce training, and educational support. A third of that funding has come through federal investments with the rest provided through nonfederal and private sector match commitments. The rigorous evaluations that are a core component of the SIF have found positive effects of SIF-funded work in the areas of workforce training, employment services, personal (income) savings, reading education, and childhood health.



We strongly encourage you to ensure continued full funding for the Social Innovation Fund at \$70 million dollars, including a 20% set aside for Pay for Success so that locally-driven approaches to solving major social challenges can continue to expand and achieve measureable impacts in our nation's communities. Through SIF, during a time of shrinking budgets and growing need, government has improved its ability to do more with less, focus on results and accountability, and break down silos.

We recognize the many difficult choices both the Subcommittee and full Committee faces and thank you for your ongoing support for social innovation policies. We look forward to working with you to advance this important issue in the months ahead.
